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Highlights

During this tour we saw 19 species of mammals, 151 bird species, and nine species of reptiles. We had good sightings of Blue Whales and were able to enjoy watching several Spinner Dolphin pods that swam alongside our boat.

At Yala we encountered the elusive Leopards, along with many other mammals, including Asian Elephant, Sambar, Spotted Deer, Wild Boar, Water Buffalo, Ruddy Mongoose, Grey Langurs and Toque Macaque.

We also witnessed the behaviour of an adult male Asian Elephant with a young calf: the calf kept trying to get the attention of the grown male elephant by trying to play a game of sorts, going back and forth; it was an incredible sight to witness.

Day 1

Saturday 2nd March

The tour started with an overnight flight from the UK to Sri Lanka.

Day 2

Sunday 3rd March

Arrive Colombo; travel to Weligama

The flight arrived at Bandaranaike International Airport at 12.30 pm; we greeted the group at the arrivals lounge and left the airport at 1.45 pm. We came across the following birds on our way to hotel and some within the hotel premises: Indian Peafowl, Black-headed Ibis, Indian Pond Heron, Eastern Cattle Egret, Great Egret, Little Egret, Little Cormorant, Brahminy Kite, Rock Dove, Orange-breasted Green Pigeon, Spotted Dove, Asian Koel, Asian Palm Swift, White-throated Kingfisher, Indian (Large-billed) Crow, Barn Swallow and Common Myna. Apart from the birds, we also saw Purple-faced Leaf Monkey, Toque Macaque, Indian Palm Squirrel and also a Common House Gecko.

We reached Fisherman's Bay Resort in Weligama at 5.15 pm and met for dinner at 7.15 pm. After dinner we got together and went through the checklist and briefing for the next day and called it a night.

Day 3

Monday 4th March

Weligama

Our day started early at 6am; we took breakfast packs and were at Mirissa Harbour by 7am, for our first whale-watching trip. From the boat we saw Striated Heron, Gull-billed Tern, and Whiskered Tern. Once we were out at sea, we saw three Blue Whales within a short radius, even though it was an overcast day. We followed the three whales in chorus for a while until it was time to head back to the shore. Upon returning to the hotel at 11.30am, we had lunch and relaxed until 3.30pm.

In the afternoon we visited the Kirala Kele Sanctuary. Bird sightings included: Asian Openbill, Yellow Bittern, Cinnamon Bittern, Purple Heron, Oriental Darter, Lesser Whistling Duck, Purple Heron, Great Egret, White-

bellied Sea Eagle, White-breasted Waterhen, Orange-breasted Green Pigeon, Green Imperial Pigeon, Black-hooded Oriole, Watercock, Greater Crested Tern, Asian Koel, Asian Palm Swift, Stork-billed Kingfisher, Blue-tailed Bee-eater, Brown-headed Barbet, Rose-ringed Parakeet, Crimson-fronted Barbet, Brown Shrike, White-bellied Drongo, House Crow, White-browed Bulbul, Sri Lanka Swallow, Plain Prinia, Common Tailorbird, Grey-headed Swamphen (now a separate species from Purple Swamphen), Oriental Magpie-Robin, Red-vented Bulbul, Yellow-billed Babbler, Purple-rumped Sunbird, Loten's Sunbird and White-rumped Munia. Apart from the birds we also saw a Bengal Land Monitor.

We returned to the hotel at 6.15pm. We had dinner at 7.15pm, followed by going through the checklist and a briefing for the next day before we called it a night.

Day 4

Tuesday 5th March

Weligama

We left the hotel at 6am; it took us 15 minutes to reach Mirissa Harbour. Our boat left the harbour at 7am and we were at sea till 10.30am. There were no sightings of Whales around the corner; however, we saw several pods of Spinner Dolphins. Just as we were about to turn around and head back to shore, out of the depths rose a solitary Blue Whale; we were able to watch and record the whale as it majestically moved through the ocean for about 30 minutes before it disappeared into depths of the Indian Ocean once again. Apart from the many birds we saw a Common Garden Lizard.

In the afternoon at 4pm we visited Galle Fort a UNESCO World Heritage City. While walking inside the Fort and taking in the architectural wonder and enjoying the surroundings and environment, we were able to see Red-wattled Lapwing, Little Swift and House Sparrow. We were back at Fisherman's Bay by 7.45pm. We met for dinner at 8.30pm; we then went through the checklist and, once the briefing for the next day was over, we called it a night.

Day 5

Wednesday 6th March

Weligama

It was an early start to our day at 6am from Fisherman Bay Hotel, and it took us 15 minutes to get to Mirissa Fishing Harbour and Fish Market. We left port at 7am, and towards the end of the boat ride we encountered a large pod of Spinner Dolphins which rode alongside our boat and occasionally spun out of the water, leaving everyone speechless and in awe of this glorious sight.

We reached the hotel for a late lunch and in the late afternoon, we decided to go to the turtle hatchery as an optional visit. Throughout the day we were able to see Shikra, Bridled Tern, Common Iora and Indian Robin. As well as these birds we were able to see a large Asian Water Monitor that was about 3 metres long.

We came back to the hotel at 5.15pm and met up for dinner at 7.15pm and did our usual routine until we said goodnight to each other.

Day 6

Thursday 7th March

Yala

We had our breakfast at 8am and checked out of the hotel at 9am. En route to Yala we encountered many birds we had seen in the past few days, along with Knob-billed Duck, Comb Duck, Painted Stork, Eurasian Spoonbill, Grey Heron, Spot-billed Pelican, Great Stone-curlew (also known as Great Thick-knee), Black-winged Stilt, Pacific Golden Plover, Grey Plover, Little Ringed Plover, Greater Painted-snipe, Black-tailed Godwit, Common Redshank, Common Kingfisher, Pied Kingfisher, Green Bee-eater, Lesser Goldenback, White-browed Fantail, Ashy-crowned Sparrow-Lark, Oriental White-eye, Purple Sunbird, Paddyfield Pipit and Blyth's Pipit.

We reached Cinnamon Wild Hotel in Yala at 3pm and at 5pm we did a bird walk around the hotel premises. The lush surroundings were home to birds such as Black-crowned Night Heron, Kentish Plover, Lesser Sand Plover, Marsh Sandpiper, Common Greenshank, Wood Sandpiper, Common Sandpiper, Little Stint, Curlew Sandpiper, Caspian Tern, Little Tern and Indian Pitta that we were able to see, as well as many other birds that we had already seen on our travels over the past few days. Apart from birds we saw Grey Langur, Wild Boar, Water Buffalo, Indian Hare, Mugger Crocodile, Asian Elephant and Spotted Deer.

We did the checklist at 7.15pm, followed by the next day briefing and enjoyed our dinner.

Day 7

Friday 8th March

Yala

We left the hotel at 5.30am after tea/coffee for our safari. As soon as we entered the Yala National Park our first sighting was of a Leopard; we observed this elusive cat until it disappeared in to the thick foliage.

Our second sighting came a while later while our jeep was parked: the Leopard walked slowly behind our jeep, much to our amusement, and swiftly disappeared into the forest when it heard the engine noise of an oncoming Jeep. We were extremely lucky to see a herd of wild Elephants with a few youngsters roaming in an open wetland and were able to witness the very unique and amazing behaviour of these majestic creatures.

Our third sighting of the Leopard happened around 4.30 pm: we spotted the Leopard resting on a tree only a few feet away from our jeep. We were able to observe this majestic cat for about 45 minutes until it decided to come down from the tree. We were able to take many photographs with the evening sun setting in the background, which is every wildlife photographer's and enthusiast's dream shot!

Throughout the day we were able to see many birds such as Sri Lanka Junglefowl, Lesser Adjutant, Intermediate Egret, Crested Serpent Eagle, Changeable Hawk-Eagle, Greater Coucal, Blue-faced Malkoha, Jacobin Cuckoo, Crested Treeswift, Chestnut-headed Bee-eater, Common Hoopoe, Common Kestrel, Sri Lanka Woodshrike, Black-headed Cuckooshrike, Indian Paradise Flycatcher, Jerdon's Bush Lark, Brahminy Starling, Black-throated Munia, Tricolored Munia and other birds we had already seen before. Apart from the birds we were able to see Golden Jackal, Sambar, Water Buffalo and Common Skink.

We returned to the hotel, had dinner followed by our daily routine of going through our checklist and the briefing for the next day and called it a night.

Day 8

Saturday 9th March

Yala

Our day started at 5.30am; after having tea/coffee, we set out on our safari. Our encounter with the Leopard was brief as it speedily ran across the road allowing us to have only a quick gaze before it disappeared.

Apart from the Leopard we were able to see a Small Indian Civet and Soft-shelled Terrapin. We were also able to see many birds that we have already seen before and some new ones such as Barred Buttonquail, Yellow-wattled Lapwing and Pheasant-tailed Jacana. With these sightings our half-day safari came to an end and we returned to the hotel for lunch.

After relaxing for a few hours, we did our bird walk around the hotel premises from 5pm to 6pm, where we got the opportunity to see a Malabar Pied Hornbill apart from the many other birds we have seen before.

We met for dinner at 7.15pm did our checklist and the briefing for tomorrow and called it a night.

Main Tour Day 9 / Extension Day 1

Sunday 10th March

Katunayake (Main tour); Sinharaja (Extension)

We had breakfast at 8am and checked out of the hotel at 9.30am. On the way we did birding at Debarawewa and encountered Jungle Owlet, Indian Cormorant, many Fruit Bats that shadowed massive rain trees, and one Grizzled Giant Squirrel, apart from many other animals that we had seen before. We stopped for lunch at a very convenient place and had traditional Sri Lankan meal. After lunch we split up, as three members of the group departed for Sinharaja for the birdwatching extension, while the rest set off to Katunayake for their final night's stay.

The main group reached the Airport Garden Hotel at 7.45pm and enjoyed a leisurely dinner. Meanwhile, the Extension party reached the Blue Magpie Lodge at 5.30pm. We had a briefing about the next day's programme before dinner and called it a night.

Main Tour Day 10 / Extension Day 2

Monday 11th March

Sinharaja

The main group proceeded to the airport in time for their flight after enjoying their breakfast at the hotel.

The extension group left the hotel at 6am after having breakfast. We reached the Sinharaja Rainforest with our picnic lunch. During the walk we encountered Sri Lanka Blue Magpie, Common Emerald Dove, Sri Lanka Green Pigeon, Green-billed Coucal, Chestnut-backed Owlet, Sri Lanka Frogmouth, Indian Swiftlet, Sri Lanka Grey Hornbill, Brown-capped Pygmy Woodpecker, Yellow-crowned Woodpecker, Crimson-backed Flameback, Alexandrine Parakeet, Orange Minivet, Sri Lanka Drongo, Black-naped Monarch, Sri Lanka Blue Magpie, Black-capped Bulbul, Yellow-browed Bulbul, Black Bulbul, Orange-billed Babbler, Ashy-headed Laughingthrush, Spot-winged Thrush, Brown-breasted Flycatcher, Golden-fronted Leafbird, Legge's Flowerpecker, Pale-billed Flowerpecker, Black-throated Munia and Dark-fronted Babbler .

We saw a Layard's Striped Squirrel, Sri Lanka Green Pit Viper, Sri Lanka Kangaroo Lizard, and Crestless Lizard and giant millipede apart from the many birds we saw during the day.

We returned to the hotel at 3pm and rested while enjoying the treasure trove of wildlife right outside our hotel room. In the evening we did the checklist at 7.30pm and then had our dinner, followed by the briefing for the next day.

Extension Day 3

Tuesday 12th March

Sinharaja

We had breakfast at 6am and left to Sinharaja rainforest for another excursion. We encountered Legge's Hawk-Eagle, Besra, Red-faced Malkoha, Malabar Trogon, Yellow-fronted Barbet, Plum-headed Parakeet, Layard's Parakeet, Sri Lanka Hill Myna and Grey Wagtail. We returned to the hotel at 1pm for our lunch and relaxed for a few hours listening to the various calls from different types of creatures.

We did a bird walk from 5pm to 6pm around the Sinharaja village and were able to see many birds that we had seen before. We returned to the hotel and did the checklist at 7.30pm, followed by the briefing and dinner.

Extension Day 4

Wednesday 13th March

Sinharaja to Katunayake

We did a pre-breakfast birding session and returned to the hotel for breakfast at 9.30am. We were at leisure till 12.30. We then checked out of our hotel and drove on to Katunayake. We reached the Airport Garden hotel and met for dinner at 8pm followed by the checklist and called it a night.

Extension Day 5

Thursday 14th March

Katunayake

We left the hotel at 9.30 am and travelled to the airport in time for our flight back to UK, where another Naturetrek adventure came to an end.
